<p>2019 Entrepreneurship Prize Presentations Following the successful launch of the annual Entrepreneurship Prize in 2014, we have invited this year's joint winners and runner up to present their projects.</p> <p><i>Asan: Making periods worry-free for all</i> (Ira Guha KC 2011) Joint winner Asan is a social enterprise that aims to tackle period poverty in India by distributing menstrual cups, which are an affordable, hygienic and reusable feminine hygiene product made from silicone. In Hindi, "Asan" means easy or worry-free. Asan's mission is to make periods a worry-free experience for Indian women, the majority of whom cannot afford the monthly expense of tampons and pads – leading them to miss out on essential daily activities such as school and work.</p> <p><i>WaterScope: Innovation for global health</i> (Alexander Patto KC 2012) Innovation to address the challenges in developing countries is extremely difficult to get right, with the scene littered with failed solutions. Joint winner WaterScope is a University of Cambridge spin-out developing a simple, rapid testing system for bacterial contamination in drinking water.</p> <p><i>SpaceTime Enterprises: The Virtual Astronaut</i> (Kathryn O'Donnell KC 1993) Runner up SpaceTime Enterprises is a joint venture between two niche consultancies: In-Space Missions, experts in Space Mission design; and REWIND, leaders in Augmented/Virtual Reality (AR/VR) creative production. Their aim is to democratise space through the provision of (AR/VR) products developed using high-resolution, real-time space imagery generated from their own in-orbit assets with a plan to stream the earth in real-time for mass-market customers.</p>	Keynes Hall	3.00pm – 4.00pm
