# WORK COMPLETED AND NOTABLE EVENTS IN THE ARCHIVE CENTRE

#### JANUARY TO DECEMBER 2023

#### **PERSONNEL**

- Librarians supported the Assistant Archivist who had increased responsibilities for the second half of the year due to the archivist having extended bereavement.
- 1 student was employed part-time over the summer and 4 volunteers stayed for between 4 days and 10 months.

#### RESEARCH AND SUPPORT

- Archivists supported the College by:
  - ▶ facilitating the College's Historic Links to Slavery researchers;
  - advising on data protection issues and updating the manual for the Gatelist as updates to the software were developed;
  - providing images and facts about the choir and screen renovation to the Chapel architects, and about the nearby pump to the Maintenance and Gardens departments;
  - investigating (with the College Librarian) Catering and Merchandise incomegenerating possibilities;
  - reviewing consent forms for the project to update to the Spurling report;
  - > compiling a list of the known inhabitants of Gibbs' Building, which will aid the Development Office's fundraising.
- Archivists provided images and assistance to an external author writing a book about Bloomsbury and clothing.

#### CATALOGUING and COLLECTIONS MANAGEMENT

- The College's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations inspired the donation of the original Research Club case for admitting women to King's, as well as the donor's memoir of the late 1960s at King's.
- Original material by Janetta Parladé was given by an author who had been lent it by her family.
- The College purchased a page proposing and solving a mathematical puzzle, written by Alan Turing.
- Two new letters by JM Keynes were given by the descendant of the recipient.

# RECORDS MANAGEMENT and DATA PROTECTION

As well as routine Freedom of Information, confidential shredding and data protection activities:

- 4 new members of staff were inducted in the Records Management programme and Data Protection/FOI obligations.
- The project to select Catering Department files from 1997 to 2006 for accession to the College Archive was continued.
- A data sharing agreement for the School was finalised which resulted in a major update of the Choir part of the Retention Schedule and privacy policy.
- Privacy policies for the students and staff were updated to match existing processing activities, and a new privacy policy written for the E-lab's inaugural essay competition.

• The new College Registrar worked with archivists on formalising the format of, and regular review of, privacy policies, as well as data protection issues arising from the proposed use of K-x for the College calendar.

#### **EXHIBITIONS and OUTREACH**

- Exhibitions were given to:
  - ➤ California State University Fresno (about Bloomsbury)
  - Fellows of the RHS (about the grounds and gardens)
  - Legacy Lunch and the College's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary event (about Women and King's)
  - ➤ The annual Turing Lecture (about Alan Turing)
  - ➤ The E-lab's Phil Vincent event (about King's engineers)
  - Foundation Lunch and the Alumni Weekend (about wax seals)
  - > Open Cambridge and the 1441 event (about Shakespeare and Theatre in Cambridge)
  - The Colleges 50<sup>th</sup> and 60<sup>th</sup> anniversaries (Highlights of the Archives)
  - ➤ The New Postgraduates dinner and to welcome our new Provost (about Provosts)
  - > Guests of the Provost's ghost story reading (about MR James)
  - E-lab essay winners (an introduction to King's and its engineers and entrepreneurs)
  - Friends of the San Diego Symphony Orchestra, Friends of Kettle's Yard, the Jane Austen Society, and a St John's College group who had been reading EM Forster's novel *Maurice* (about the relevant topics)
- 19 VIP visits were given for guests of the Development Office, the Rivers Project and/or the Provost.
- The Archivist presented a review of the Turing Digital Archive 20 years on, to an online symposium on scientific papers.
- Pop-up exhibitions on Science and Religion, and on Margaret Masterman, were given in conjunction with talks given in College.
- The archivist collaborated with the retired Domus Bursar on a tour of Gibbs followed by an exhibition, as part of the College's fundraising for renovating the building.
- Tours of the library building and an 'open house' with exhibition were given for King's members; tours and an exhibition designed especially for Visitor Guides were subsequently given.
- Alan Turing material on loan to the Rijksmuseum Boerhaave in Leiden was retrieved.
- The University Majlis Society obtained copies of College documents about the Majlis for an exhibition at Trinity College.
- Blogs were published on the Turing acquisition and on Frank Ramsey.
- Relations with Wuhan University were further strengthened by submitting scans of much of the Julian Bell Wuhan-related archives.
- The exhibition on wax seals was published online with a notice submitted to the relevant newsletter.

- With the Domus Bursar, develop the display of facsimiles and non-archival historic material in unused corners of the College.
- Assist as required with the renovation of the Chapel exhibition.
