## **Principal Business**

### 69. Legacies of Slavery Report

The Vice-Provost presented the final report of the Legacies of Slavery Committee. He noted that Governing Body had already received the Committee's preliminary report and highlighted that many recommendations made in that report had already been acted upon. The Vice Provost extended his thanks to all Fellows and staff that made the research project, which culminates in this final report and the recommendations made within it, possible.

The Vice-Provost explained that the Report presents recommendations alongside the College's Officers' view on enactment of each of those proposals. He highlighted a major proposal made in the Report, which is to ringfence an element of the College endowment for initiatives aimed to benefit those from backgrounds adversely affected by the slave trade.

Professor Austin, a key contributor to the Committee, emphasised that the project was rooted in scholarly enquiry.

The Senior Officers responded to queries about how income from the proposed ringfenced element of the endowment would be applied, and the input the Senior Officers had had in formulating the proposals.

The Vice-Provost clarified that the Senior Officers had been asked by Council to explore how proposals made by the Committee could be implemented in practice.

The Senior Tutor committed to work with the Admissions Tutor to implement an increased emphasis on widening the participation of BME individuals in student admissions.

The Vice-Provost elaborated on how the figure of £2,000,000 had been reached as an appropriate element of the endowment to ringfence. The number had been reached by attempting to translate an estimate of the benefits the College had received as a result of involvement in slavery into a present-day equivalent figure, although he noted the inherent difficulties of calculating this accurately. The suggestion was made that the £2 million should be index-linked in order to sustain its value. The Director of Development asked the Vice-Provost to clarify what sum the Development Office was being asked to raise matched funding for. The Vice-Provost clarified that this would be in relation to a Post-Graduate Studentship, half funded by the College, with the remainder of the funding being sought from donors.

Governing Body raised the question of whether the College could pursue partnerships with educational institutions abroad in areas particularly impacted by the slave trade and noted that some moves in this direction were already being taken.

Governing Body asked that the College's work on tackling the legacies of slavery was shared with Cambridge college leadership communities more widely, to facilitate knowledge-sharing and transparency.

Governing Body agreed:

- a) To receive with thanks the Report of the Legacies of Slavery committee; and
- b) To accept the recommendations of the Report.

### 70. **Examination Results**

The Senior Tutor presented a paper to Governing Body outlining the current position regarding exam results from the 2023 exam season. She explained that the ongoing marking and assessment boycott, lead by the University and College Union, meant College had been unable secure a full set of marks for a majority of its undergraduate students (a situation expected to prevail for some time).

The Senior Tutor highlighted the proforma letter being used to support students seeking to move on to further study or training in the absence of their exam results. She invited members of Governing Body to contact the Tutorial Office if they needed assistance supporting students in this regard.

Additionally, the Senior Tutor drew Governing Body's attention to the upcoming supervision boycott. She highlighted that the majority of College teaching was carried out by individuals who may participate in the boycott. She urged Governing Body to remain mindful of the likely impact of this boycott when planning teaching for Michaelmas term.

Governing Body agreed to authorise the Senior Tutor to delay her report on Examination Results until Michaelmas term 2023.

#### 71. **Revised Ordinances**

In the Provost's absence, the Vice Provost presented proposed revised College Ordinances to Governing body for their second reading.

The revised Ordinances had initially been presented to Governing Body, and approved, at Congregation on 26<sup>th</sup> June 2023. The Vice-Provost now, in accordance with the College's Governing Documents, asked Governing Body to approve them for the second time, to enable the proposed Ordinances to come into effect with the new Statutes on 31<sup>st</sup> July. Governing Body agreed to approve for the second time the revised Ordinances, first approved on 26<sup>th</sup> June 2023, to take effect on 31<sup>st</sup> July 2023.
