69. Oral Reports

i) The Senior Tutor noted the absence of Junior Members at Congregation. She explained that this was in relation to pending a disciplinary matter. Junior Member participation will recommence once that matter is resolved.

The Vice Provost noted that all Open Business matters being discussed at this Congregation had been considered at Council meetings where Junior Members were present.

ii) The Senior Tutor sought Governing Body's views on whether undergraduates should be permitted to work during term time.

Governing Body acknowledged that rules about undergraduate termtime work are not formally codified. Governing Body discussed types of financial pressure experienced by students. Governing Body also noted that some prospective undergraduates still have a perception that personal financial standing might be a barrier to studying at Cambridge. It was noted that further information about current levels of term-time paid work would be valuable. On balance, however, Governing Body's view was that the College should not start to encourage undergraduates to take on paid work during term.

The Senior Tutor thanked Governing Body for its comments.

Principal Business

70. Planning Round 2024

The First Bursar presented a paper setting out strategic priorities for the coming year and outlining a set of aims for the next 3–5 years. He thanked College Officers, Heads of Department, and members of Finance Committee, HR Committee, and Council for their work in developing and scrutinising plans for the different areas of the College.

Drawing on proposals made by the Officers, the First Bursar outlined three priorities for 2024–25: investment in teaching, research and pastoral care; shifting towards 'community'; and upgrading spaces and services essential to College life. This would be achieved through a near-breakeven budget and, within that, a shift in allocation of resources towards activities relating to education and research.

The First Bursar set out an emerging view of the College's medium-term strategic aims and placed particular emphasis on the allocation of resources towards the College's core missions of education and research.

The First Bursar presented a summary analysis of the key risks to which the College is exposed. He highlighted how work to mitigate these risks was often not visible.

Governing Body welcomed the First Bursar's approach and expressed their thanks to him and all those who participated in the planning round.

Governing Body noted that there were references to developing a JCR for undergraduate students in the paper, emphasised that the absence of such a space until now had been a deliberate and considered decision, and encouraged the College to consider carefully the impact that creating a distinct undergraduate space might have upon the College community.

Governing Body discussed how various external factors might impact the College's financial position and, in turn, the ability to work through its aims for the medium-term. It was noted that the freeze on home undergraduate fees was, in terms of student affordability, not a 'drag' on the College's core mission.

The Senior Tutor responded to queries about additional Tutorial Office staffing and noted her ongoing work to lift the administrative burden from Fellows.

Governing Body agreed to approve the College's priorities, budget, and risk approach for the financial year 2024/25.

71. Wild Flower Meadow

Dr Marshall presented a paper on behalf of the Gardens Committee which asked Governing Body to decide on the future of the Back Lawn wild flower meadow.

In 2019 Governing Body agreed to review the meadow five years after its planting. Since 2019 Dr Marshall had monitored the meadow and collected data on its impact (both environmental and social). She provided Governing Body with an overview of her findings, which had recently been published, and made the case for expanding the meadow.

The Dean of Chapel spoke to an addendum to the paper he had provided which concerned the impact the meadow has on Singing on the River. He asked Governing Body to take the event into account when reaching a decision. The Head of Development highlighted how many of her team's events rely on use of the Back Lawn and in particular that use of the back lawn had been central to the success of the festival celebrating fifty years of women at King's.

Governing Body considered whether an expanded meadow could be mowed to accommodate events when required and whether those mowed areas would be fit for purpose.

Governing Body discussed what an expanded meadow might mean for the College and whether such a decision would constitute a significant shift in the historic landscape.

Governing Body also considered whether Scholars' Piece would be a suitable alternative location for a meadow. It was shared that this had already been tested and while it is currently a grass pasture due to its highly fertile nature it would not make a suitable wildflower meadow. It was also debated whether some of Scholar's Piece could be re-purposed to provide additional amenity space for the College year-round, as well as for special events.

The Gardens Committee had asked Governing Body to consider four options (retaining the current design, completing covering the lawn, retaining a semi-circle of conventional lawn centred on the Gibbs arch, or removing the lawn entirely).

Governing Body agreed that its indicative preference was to make permanent the flower meadow on the back lawn and to partially expand it.

Governing Body asked for expansion options to be presented in greater detail at the next Congregation, and that an area of meadow should be mowed before the Congregation, so that a decision could be taken on which form of expansion should be implemented.

72. Responsible Investment Policy

The First Bursar proposed the formation of a working group to develop a responsible investment policy for the College. He noted the College's existing commitments in relation to the endowment. He outlined Charity Commission guidance with respect to the consideration of factors other than financial returns in the management of the endowment.

With regard to the working group, the First Bursar noted the engagement of students on several issues relating to the endowment and emphasised that the group ought usefully to have meaningful student representation.

Governing Body supported the formation of a working group to develop a policy but noted that it must think ahead to implementation to ensure the policy had impact. The First Bursar explained that, once agreed, the Investment Committee (including its student representatives) would address policy implementation. Any proposals for implementation would also return to Governing Body, should it so wish.

Governing Body agreed to establish a working group to draft a Responsible Investment Policy for the College. The Working Group will present a draft to Annual Congregation in 2024 with a view to implementation by the end of the 2024/25 academic year.

Governing Body agreed that Council should appoint the members of the working group.
