<u>Archive Exhibition: Keynes and the King's Economists</u> Maynard Keynes was an internationally renowned economic theorist and the father of economics as a study. But he was not only a theorist – as First Bursar of King's he was described as dogged, intrepid, and prescient and his fiscal policies in practice pulled the College through the Depressions of the 1920s and '30s. The Archive Centre at King's College is fortunate enough to hold not only Keynes' papers, but also those of his contemporaries and economists who followed in his footsteps. <u>In Conversation: Gillian Tett and Mervyn King</u> Join the Provost and Mervyn King (KC 1966), former Governor of the Bank of England, as they discuss some of the key economics questions and issues of today.		

<p>Mervyn King graduated from King's with First Class honours in 1969. He spent 22 years as an academic – in Cambridge, Birmingham, Harvard, MIT and LSE – before spending the next 22 years at the Bank of England where he was the Governor from 2003 to 2013. He was made a life peer in 2013. He is an Honorary Fellow of King's and since leaving the Bank has published two books: The End of Alchemy in 2016 and Radical Uncertainty (with John Kay) in 2020.</p> <p>Dr Gillian Tett became the College's 45th Provost on 1 October last year. An award-winning journalist and author, she is a member of the editorial board for the Financial Times and writes a weekly column covering a range of economic, financial, political and social issues.
