Dear Goldie,

I never thought to find myself in Barracks. Camp is all right: there's Romance in it: it's rather like "camping-out". But Barracks! (which is yet extraordinary like College)
I looked in at Edward's Square one morning two or three days after I got back from the Antwerp affair. But you'd

just gone to Cambridge. I was sorry to miss you. I hope you don't think me very reactionary + callous for joining taking up this function of England. There shouldn't be warbut what's to be done, but fight Prussia? I've I've seen the half million refugees in the night outside Antwerp: + I want, more than before,

to go on; till Prussia's destroyed. I wish everyone I knew were fighting.
Will you let me know what's happening about the Society? Nothing, I suppose. For I was

very glad to hear
Lucas had enlisted.

It's Does Gerald come
down? Or do angels
flutter weekly?
I suppose the authorities
know I'm not coming
up while the war

is on + so won't
want my room.
We go to a camp near
Rolandford (also near
Yeovil and Dorchester) in
a week or two: probably
for November & December.
Will you be in that
part of the world at
all? It would be nice to see you.
Cambridge is very fine
about Louvain.

Rupert'
