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S.S. Grantully Castle [Off Greece] March 9. 1915

My dear,

This is very odd. But I suppose I must imagine my non-existence, + make a few arrangements. You are to be my literary executor. But I'd like mother to have my M.S.S. till she dies – the actual paper + ink, I mean, then you – save one or two you might let Alfred + Katharine Cox have, if they care. If you want to go through my papers, Dudley Ward'll give you a hand. But you won't find much there. There may be some old stuff at Grantchester. You must decide everything about publication. Don't print much bad stuff. Give my love to the New Numbers folk, + Violet + Masefield + a few who'd like it. I've tried to arrange that some money should go to Wilfred + Lascelles + de la Mare (John is childless) to

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help them write good stuff, instead of me. There's nothing much to say. You'll be able to help the Ranee with one or two arrangements.

You've been very good to me. I wish I'd written more. I've been such a failure. Best love + goodbye
