INTRODUCTORY NOTICES

ATTENDING CHAPEL SERVICES

WE warmly invite members of the public and the wider University to join us for our choral services. We enjoy the diversity of the congregations that gather day by day and are glad to welcome people of all faiths and none. Most services last at least three quarters of an hour, some longer—up to an hour and a quarter.

Most days, anything up to an hour before a service begins, a queue forms at the main entrance to College. Half an hour before the service, the College gate is opened and the queue moves forward. A quarter of an hour before the service, people are admitted to the Chapel itself. Five minutes before the service begins, the main gate of College is closed and, to ensure a calm and timely start to all our services, any who arrive later are not admitted.

Inside College there are three queues. The queue alongside the Chapel is the main one and is for members of the public. Members of the University are invited to queue on the north side of the Chapel. Only members and staff of King's College and School, and choir families, are invited to queue in front of the Gibbs' Building.

When you come to a service, please bear the following four points in mind:

- * We ask you not to bring any bag that is larger than airline hand-luggage size.
- * We ask that you take a seat in the Ante-chapel if you cannot commit to remaining for the whole service.
- * We do not allow recording or photography of any kind in services and strongly request that phones be turned off.
- * We regret that there are no public toilet facilities available in College.

If you or anyone attending with you has any special needs that we might be able to help you with, or if you are coming in a group of ten or more people and wish to be seated together, or if you have any other questions about attending, please contact the Chapel Manager, whose details are printed on page 5.

The initials KC in this booklet are used to designate membership of King's College.

from THE DEAN

EASTER TERM in King's College Chapel always brings an exciting range of services and performances and this year is no exception.

We welcome The Revd Dr Jonathan Kimber, who has been appointed Interim Chaplain for us this term and the next academic year. Jonathan has served as Director of Ministry in Worcester Diocese (2015–23) and as a parish priest in Northampton. Over the last two years he has developed freelance work as a trainer, coach and supervisor (especially with clergy), and completed his forthcoming book, *Fullness of Vision*, *Fullness of Life*. Jonathan studied maths as an undergraduate here at King's and he is delighted to be back. Although his official title is 'Interim Chaplain' and part of his role is to provide continuity after the Dean's retirement, we will mostly refer to Jonathan simply as 'Chaplain'.

On Sunday II May we offer the *Sermon Before the University*. This year's Sermon will be a very different occasion from previous years. Rather than invite one distinguished speaker to give an address at Choral Matins, I am inviting three different speakers each to give a short address. King's College Choir will sing, but the occasion will not be shaped as a Christian worship service but as the opportunity to hear from three women who will speak from the perspectives of each of the great Abrahamic faiths.

We continue our series of sermons which address the question 'What is Truth?' with contributions from The Revd Professor Jane Shaw of Oxford University and Professor Larry Samuelson from Yale University, who is a Visiting Fellow at King's this year.

We very much look forward to hearing The Rt Revd Chris Lowson, former Visitor and The Revd Mark Birch Mvo of Wesminster Abbey preach at our Eucharistic services.

On Wednesday 18 June our service will be broadcast live on BBC Radio 3. It begins at 3 pm but you need to be seated by 2.50 pm if you wish to attend.

We very much look forward to hosting the Choir of St John's College on Thursday 3 July, when the service will be at 6 pm.

The final service of our academic year with valediction of leaving members of the Choir will be on Sunday 6 July at 3.30 pm.

Non-scriptural readings at Evensong on Mondays & Wednesdays

At Evensong on Mondays and Wednesdays, the second reading is taken from a non-scriptural source. This term we are using *Revelations of Divine Love* by Julian of Norwich.

 \sim

JULIAN of NORWICH, born in 1342, was an anchoress and mystic. She lived a life focused on prayer, in a tiny cell or room from which she never departed. It is thought her cell had a window looking onto the church and another looking out onto the world, where she conversed with people who came to seek her wisdom.

We know about her through her writing, preserved in a book called *Revelations of Divine Love*, the earliest known writing in English by a woman. This is what established her as a mystic and theologian. It contains 'Shewings': 16 revelations over two days in 1373 when Julian suffered a near-fatal illness. These are contained in a 'short text', written in the mid-fifteenth century, as well as a 'long text', which is a product of meditation over a period of 20 years on these revelations.

Julian lived during very difficult times, through the Black Death, war with France, civil and church conflict and in a time of hunger, poverty and want. Yet, the God revealed to Julian was a God of love, wisdom and mercy, a God in whom there is 'no wrath', in a time when a wrathful God was very much the expectation.

The readings chosen for this term come from both the short and the long text. They are chosen to provide a counterpoint to the Bible reading of the day, either harmonising with it, developing it, or revealing an alternative perspective. Overall, they reveal a God who is in all that is created, who loves us as a mother, as well as being as a father and a spouse to us, who cannot be angry with us, but rather delights in us; they also explore the nature of being human, what our soul is, what sin is, and conclude, hopefully, that despite the presence of sin and suffering, 'I will make all things well, and I shall make all things well; and you will see for yourself that all things shall be well.'
